The California Biomass Energy Alliance appreciates the opportunity to comment on the outline of proposed changes to the RPS Guidebook as presented at "Scoping Meeting on Proposed Updates for the RPS Eligibility Guidebook, 10th Edition" May 21st. CBEA is only commenting on the section "Facilities with Air Permits."

Most if not all of California's wood waste biomass power generating facilities have Title V permits. These facilities already compile and submit detailed emissions information to multiple agencies (e.g., CARB, EPA, RCEA, and local air districts). These include annual emissions inventory reports, GHG verifications, and other compliance submittals as required by our permit conditions.

In principle, the requirement to submit emissions documentation does not pose an operational issue, provided the RPS Guidebook allows facilities to submit existing documentation already reviewed by regulatory agencies (e.g., Title V Annual Compliance Certifications, Emissions Inventory Reports, third-party GHG verifications). However, if the CEC intends to create a separate or duplicative reporting mechanism, it could impose unnecessary administrative burden on fully compliant facilities.

Additionally, the proposed language around certification suspension for noncompliance is vague. It would be helpful for CEC to clarify what constitutes "noncompliance" (e.g., administrative errors vs. permit exceedances) and what due process would be afforded before any action is taken.
