As you may know, VC Renewables has recently modified their clean energy project, the Soda Mountain Solar and Battery Storage Project, located approximately six miles southwest of the town of Baker on 2,670 acres of federally managed land overseen by the Bureau of Land Management. I am proud to support this project as it will strengthen our energy infrastructure and improve the job market of a rural and underserved community.

The proposed project features a 300 MW solar facility coupled with 1,200 MWh of battery storage—sufficient to provide power to more than 140,000 homes, representing nearly one-fifth of all households in San Bernardino County. This large-scale initiative will play a crucial role in stabilizing California's power grid, mitigating significant energy price fluctuations, and reducing the risk of rolling blackouts.

Critically, the original plan was approved as a solar-only facility. The updated proposal improves the initial design by adding battery storage and decreasing the project's overall footprint. The new configuration situates the project adjacent to Interstate 15 and the planned Southern California-to-Las Vegas rail line. By integrating battery storage and refining the layout, the revised project offers a more compact footprint that enhances grid reliability for consumers.

In addition to expanding renewable energy generation and supporting grid stability, this project will bring substantial economic benefits to the region, including critical infrastructure investment, the creation of hundreds of construction jobs, increased annual tax revenue, and positive secondary economic effects for the High Desert.
