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CALGreen was initially developed and adopted in response to policy directives from the Governor, founded on statutory directives to address climate change. In 2008, the Building Standards Commission ("Commission") was given the express authority to adopt green building codes:

If no state agency has the authority or expertise to propose green building standards applicable to a particular occupancy, the Commission shall adopt, approve, codify, update, and publish green building standards for those occupancies.²

The statute also recognizes that other agencies, including the Energy Commission, may adopt such standards. The Energy Commission has the expertise to adopt voluntary energy efficiency standards for buildings.

The 2013 Energy Provisions of CALGreen are voluntary measures which provide more of the same energy and environmental benefits of the 2013 Building Energy Efficiency Standards (2013 Standards), which were previously adopted by the Energy Commission, and do not include any standards which alter previous findings for the 2013 Standards. Although voluntary in nature, the 2013 Energy Provisions of CALGreen have the potential to increase the efficiency of and conserve the use of energy by reducing the energy budget otherwise allotted to a building in the 2013 Standards.
