The September 30th letter and staff's follow-up phone calls and emails were intended to gauge tribal interests in a proposed change in the design of the Sonoran Energy Project (Sonoran) (Formerly Blythe Energy Project Phase II (BEPII)).

The Sonoran project site is located in the city of Blythe, approximately five miles west of the city center, in eastern Riverside County. The approximately 76-acre site is located immediately adjacent to the operational Blythe Energy Project (BEPI). The site is bounded to the north by Riverside Avenue, to the east by the existing BEPI, and to the south by Hobsonway. The site is fenced, sparsely vegetated, and relatively flat, sloping from an elevation of 350 feet in the northern portion of the parcel to 340 feet in the southern portion.

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Enclosed please find a project related ethnographic report authored by David Halmo, Ph.D. entitled, *Blythe Energy Projects; American Indian Ethnographic Assessment Study – Final Report*, that may be useful for understanding the origins of CUL-9.

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Since September, Energy Commission staff has prepared and published a preliminary assessment of the proposed amendment. The cultural resources section summarizes staff's preliminary conclusion:

Staff concludes that the proposed amendment would have no new cultural resource impacts and the mitigation for the original project would likely still be applicable and would not require any substantive changes. However, some changes to Condition of Certification CUL-9 ... may be warranted, after further consultation with tribes, Western Area Power Administration (Western), and the California Office of Historic Preservation (OHP).¹

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Staff further summarizes why Condition of Certification CUL-9 may require changes:

Existing Condition of Certification CUL-9 may be subject to revision based upon ongoing consultations with affiliated tribal governments. There are discrepancies among: 1) the list of tribes contacted in 2005 when there was a past federal (Western) nexus to the project, 2) the list of tribes named in CUL-9, and 3) the list of tribes that staff routinely consults with on projects in the same area and over the last 5 years. (Ibid 4.3-8)

Staff would like to know if your tribe wants to be among the tribes listed in CUL-9 to be invited to bless the project area and conduct other appropriate ceremonies. Please reply to Thomas Gates by March 21, 2016 if you want your tribe listed in CUL-9.
