I saw your email from this auto email and I hope you can make time to read it.

My hope is to get someone to read the material and validate it...why?...so millions of gallons of water can be saved and energy can be reduced.

No rebates needed....nothing except require ACV automatic control valves for commercial irrigation installations. This simple idea is not new. It is just not in the CA Plumbing code, IAPMO - UPC code or Title 24.

In fact there are CA Cities that know this is fact because they have installed the valves and are enjoying lower water bills.

It is real simple.....the Ca Plumbing code (UPC code) does not require pressure reducing valves for commercial irrigation. The UPC does require prv valves for potable water but not irrigation.

If an Assembly Bill mandated pressure reducing valves - specifically ACV type millions of gallons of water would be saved. Also if a timer is put on the ACV valves even more water is saved.

The California Energy Commission is making the Draft 2015 Integrated Energy Policy Report (2015 IEPR) available for public comment. The report was prepared in response to Public Resources Code Section 25301 which requires the Energy Commission to prepare an IEPR every two years that includes assessments and forecasts of all aspects of energy industry supply, production, transportation, delivery and distribution, demand, and prices. The Energy Commission uses these assessments and forecasts to develop energy policies that conserve resources, protect the environment, ensure energy reliability, enhance the state's economy, and protect public health and safety. Senate Bill 1389 (Bowen and Sher, Chapter 568, Statutes of 2002) directs state government entities to use the information and analyses contained in the adopted IEPR to carry out their energy-related duties and responsibilities.

On October 20, 2015, Commissioner Andrew McAllister, the Energy Commission's Lead Commissioner for the Integrated Energy Policy Report, will conduct a workshop to receive public comments on the 2015 IEPR. Other commissioners may attend the workshop.
