Background

Executive Order B-30-15 establishes a California greenhouse gas emissions reduction target of 40 percent below a 1990 baseline by 2030. Also, it specifically addresses the need for climate adaptation and directs the California Natural Resources Agency to identify vulnerabilities of energy sector, water resources, transportation, public health, agriculture, emergency services, forestry, biodiversity and habitat, and ocean and coastal resources to climate change *by regions* and to outline primary risks to residents, property, communities and natural systems from these vulnerabilities.¹

State agencies must take climate change into account in planning and decision making to avoid high mitigation costs in the future. Improving the resilience of infrastructure and protecting the state's most vulnerable populations involves considering projected climate scenarios, local risks to extreme events, and tools to visualize and analyze the climate impacts. Ultimately, California's climate resilience depends on development of appropriate policies as well as implementation of scientifically sound strategies to cope with such impacts as changing temperatures, rising sea levels, enhanced wildfire risk, and diminished snow pack.

Agenda

This workshop will begin with a review of recent climate adaptation policies and programs that focus on energy issues at the national, state, and regional levels.

Energy Commission staff and researchers will present recent enhancements to existing tools (Cal-Adapt, COSMoS, Climate Console) that support climate adaptation planning for the energy sector. Presentations by climate researchers will highlight new climate and sea level rise scenarios that serve as a foundation for California's Fourth Climate Change Assessment.

Representatives from state agencies, publicly-owned utilities, investor-owned utilities, and other groups will participate in a panel discussion on their efforts to increase the resiliency of California's energy system to climate impacts. Panelists will discuss their use of available climate change scenarios and tools and open a discussion of vulnerability assessment methodology, data sources and gaps to identify pathways to improve support of adaptation activities by the State.
