SUBJECT:	Huntington Beach City School District Development Fees for Commercial Development & Capacity Information		

I spoke with Dana Sauer, Administrative Assistant with the Huntington Beach City School District to find out the current school development fee for commercial development and current capacity of the District. The development fee is collected by the Huntington Beach Union High School District on behalf of the Huntington Beach City School District. Huntington Beach City and Huntington Beach Union High School District share the developer fees collected. Huntington Beach City receives 61% and the high school district receives 39%. The high school district also retains 3% of the fees for handling all collection of the fees. The current school development fee for commercial development is \$.47 per square foot. The current fee was approved on April 15, 2008.

The District is tightly staffed so additional students can quickly be considered overflow students and need to be sent to another school within their district. The state classroom standard pupil to teacher ratio is 30 to 1; however, many school districts need to get a waiver to that standard. The California Department of Education allows a pupil to teacher ratio of 33:1 for Kindergarten. The Education Code allows 33 in a single Kindergarten class as long as the district does not exceed an overall Kindergarten average of 31 students. The District does not have a waiver for Kindergarten. The District has obtained Class Size Waivers from the California Department of Education for a 32:1 ratio for grades first through third where no class can be larger than 32 students, and a 32:1 ratio for grades fourth through eighth on average district-wide.
