 - > Redondo Beach Energy Project (RBEP)— Application for Certification
 - RBEP is a proposed natural-gas fired, combined-cycle, air-cooled, 511-megawatt (MW) gross electrical generating facility that would replace the existing and still operational AES Redondo Beach Generating Station. The existing Redondo Beach Generating Station Units 1 through 8 and auxiliary boiler no. 17 will be demolished as part of the project.

Energy Commission's Role

- Energy Commission has permitting authority over thermal power plants that are 50 megawatts or greater.
- The Commission is the lead state agency for California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) review and ongoing compliance.
- Energy Commission staff is an independent party in the proceeding. Staff will prepare an independent evaluation of the environmental, engineering, and public health/safety aspects of the proposed amendment.

Energy Commission's Role

- * There are five members of the Energy Commission. The Commission has appointed Commissioners Douglas (Presiding Committee Member) and Scott (Associate Committee Member) to oversee the licensing process for this project.
- Following staff review, the Committee will issue a Presiding Member's Proposed Decision (PMPD) that makes a recommendation to the full Commission to approve, reject, or change the proposed project.

Evidentiary Hearing & Decision Process

- Committee conducts hearings to create evidentiary record
- Issues Presiding Member's Proposed Decision (PMPD). The PMPD contains findings relating to:
 - Environmental impacts, public health, engineering
 - Project's compliance with Local Laws, Ordinances, Regulations and Standards (LORS)
 - Recommends conditions of certification
 - Recommends approval or denial of the application
- Full Commission issues a Final Decision
- Appeals: Reconsideration by Commission; California Supreme Court



Energy Commission monitors compliance with all conditions of certification for the life of the project, including closure

EX PARTE RULE

- All decisions made in this case will be made solely on the basis of the <u>public record</u>.
- Contacts between interested parties and the members of the Committee regarding a substantive matter <u>must</u> occur in a <u>public</u> <u>forum</u> or in a writing distributed to all the parties and made available to the public.



EX PARTE RULE

- Purpose: to provide full disclosure to all participants of any information that may be used as a basis for the future Decision on this application.
- No off-the-record contacts concerning substantive matters are permitted to take place between interested parties and the Commissioners, their advisers, this Committee, or the Hearing Officer.

Discovery and Analysis Process

 - ✓ evaluate project alternatives; and
 - ✓ recommend conditions of certification.

- Make recommendations to the Committee



Local, State and Federal Coordination

- Energy Commission staff work closely with other governmental agencies, for example:
 - Local: City of Redondo Beach
 - Regional: Los Angeles County; South Coast Air Quality Management District; Regional Water Quality Control Board
 - State: California Coastal Commission; Department of Fish and Wildlife; California Independent System Operator; California Public Utilities Commission

Staff's Issues Identification Report

Purpose

- ✓ Inform participants of potentially significant issues staff believes it will encounter;
- Provides an early focus on important topics;
- ✓ The Issues Identification Report is not limiting. Staff, agencies and other stakeholders may identify additional significant issues, going forward.

Criteria

- ✓ Significant impacts may result from the project which may be difficult to mitigate
- ✓ The project as proposed may not comply with applicable laws, ordinances, regulations or standards (LORS)
- Conflicts may arise between the parties about the appropriate findings or conditions of certification
- ✓ Issues that can delay the 12-month siting process



Staff's Potential Issue Areas

- Environmental Justice Population
- Alternatives
- Cultural Resources
- Coordination with SCAQMD / Project Schedule



POTENTIAL ISSUE: Environmental Justice Population

- * Based upon the 2010 Census data, **59.5** percent of the total population living within the six-mile buffer of the project site constitutes an environmental justice population.
- * Staff will review the impacts resulting from the construction and operation of the proposed project to determine if there are any disproportionate impacts and propose applicable mitigation.
- Staff is working with the Public Adviser on public outreach regarding the project and its impacts.



POTENTIAL ISSUE Alternatives

- CEQA requires staff to analyze a reasonable range of alternatives to the project or the location of the project, which would feasibly attain most of the basic objectives of the project but would avoid or substantially lesson any of the significant effects of the project.
- CEQA requires a "rule of reason" that requires the environmental analysis to set forth only those alternatives necessary to permit a reasoned choice and would avoid or substantially lessen any of the significant effects of the project.
- The feasibility of alternatives is taken into account as it relates to site suitability, economic viability, availability of infrastructure, general plan consistency, other plans or regulatory limitations, jurisdictional boundaries and whether the proponent can reasonably acquire control or otherwise have access to the alternative site.

POTENTIAL ISSUE Alternatives

- Alternatives that staff will be considering in its analysis include, but are not limited to:
- No Project Alternative Scenarios
 - Reasonably foreseeable scenario The scenario most likely to occur at the RBGS without implementing the proposed RBEP and to keep the power plant in operation, including oncethrough cooling (OTC) retrofit options.
 - Decommissioning/site restoration Full decommissioning of the RBGS, including site remediation/restoration.
- Reconfigured Site Alternative
- On-Site Technology Alternatives
- Site Alternatives

Other Alternatives (e.g., distributed generation, energy efficiency,

POTENTIAL ISSUE Cultural Resources

- The AFC identifies eleven historic-period built-environment resources within the study area, including the Redondo Beach Generating Station (RBGS) and the SEA Lab building across Harbor Drive from RBGS, which was the original pump house for RBGS Unit 1.
- Staff is investigating the significance of the 1947-1948 Redondo Beach Generating Station Administration, Unit 1 and SEA Lab buildings. Significance themes which may be explored are: the Art Moderne architectural style, the design and construction by a master/important creative individual and the relationship of the site and building design to the 20th Century City Beautiful Planning

POTENTIAL ISSUE Air Quality Schedule Timing

- Preliminary Determination of Compliance (PDOC) expected in January 2014 and a Final Determination of Compliance (FDOC) expected in March 2014.
- Energy Commission staff utilizes the PDOC and FDOC in their air quality analysis; the timing of the availability of these documents will impact the proposed schedule for producing an Energy Commission final decision.

Two Levels of Public Participation

First Level – Public Comments (Informal Participation)

- Verbal comments at public meetings through Blue Cards
- Electronic comments through Commission e-commenting system
- Written comments to the Commission Dockets Unit (1516 Ninth Street, MS 4, Sacramento 95814)



First Level - Public Comments (Informal Participation)

Public comments are considered by the Commissioners and are part of the record

but

Public comments are not considered evidence and cannot be the sole basis of a decision

Two Levels of Public Participation

Second Level – Intervening (Formal Participation)

- An intervenor is a party to the proceeding, can present evidence at the hearings through witnesses, and can question the staff and applicant's witnesses
- Anyone may file a Petition to Intervene
- You do not have to be or have an attorney to intervene
- Early intervention is most effective
- The Public Adviser's Office can advise how to file a Petition to Intervene through e-filing system and to navigate the process
- Petition is considered by the assigned committee
