- 6 and I'm the Regulations Manager of the Efficiency
- 7 Division of the California Energy Commission.
- 8 This is the time and place scheduled for the
- 9 public hearing on the proposed changes to the
- 10 general service lamp regulations, Title 20,
- 11 Division 2, Chapter 4, sections 1601 through
- 12 1609, and Chapter 1, section 1004 of the
- 13 California Code of Regulations.
- 14 Pursuant to the California Administrative
- 15 Procedures Act, Government Code section 11346.8,
- 16 the Energy Commission is holding this public
- 17 hearing to allows interested parties to present
- 18 oral and/or written statements relevant to the
- 19 proposed regulations on general service lamps.
- 20 All written and oral comments made during this
- 21 hearing will be considered with as much weight as
- 22 all written comments received by the Energy
- 23 Commission during the written public comment
- 24 period held August 23rd, 2019 through October
- 25 7th, 2019.

- 1 This is a staff-held public hearing. No
- 2 Commissioners will be present. No decisions will
- 3 be made. This public hearing is being recorded by
- 4 a court reporter and on WebEx. All statements
- 5 made today will become part of the public record.
- 6 Staff will only be accepting comments on the
- 7 proposed regulations. Staff will not be
- 8 responding to those comments. Written responses
- 9 to comments is provided in the Final Statement of
- 10 Reasons, which is submitted to the California
- 11 Office of Administrative Law.
- 12 The proposed regulations for general
- 13 service lamps will be considered by the
- 14 California Energy Commission for adoption at its
- 15 Wednesday, November 13th, 2019 bus meeting as
- 16 announced when the business meeting agenda was
- 17 published on Friday, November 1st, 2019. The
- 18 business meeting will begin at 10:00 a.m. and
- 19 will be held in the Rosenfeld Hearing Room on the
- 20 first floor of the Energy Commission.
- 21 In response to comments received during
- 22 the 45-day written comment period, Staff may
- 23 recommend that the Commission exclude proposed
- 24 changes to section 1605.1 but will continue to
- 25 recommend the adoption of all other proposed

- 1 language.
- 2 The record for this public hearing will
- 3 be kept open until 1:00 p.m. today, November 6th,
- 4 2019, or until every person present, in person of
- 5 via webinar, who indicates a desire to speak has
- 6 had an opportunity to do so. Please give your
- 7 full name and any affiliation before making your
- 8 comments.
- 9 Copies of the Initial Statement of
- 10 Reasons, Notice of Proposed Action, and proposed
- 11 express terms are available on the table in the
- 12 lobby.
- I will begin by taking phone-in comments,
- 14 followed by in-person comments.
- 15 So at this time, I will take comments
- 16 from phone-in participants. Please use the
- 17 raise-hand feature.
- 18 (Pause)
- 19 MS. FISHMAN: Okay. At this time,
- 20 nobody's indicated a desire to phone in, so we'll
- 21 move to take comments from in-person
- 22 participants. And then we'll go back to the
- 23 phone-in afterwards to see if anybody else is
- 24 there.
- 25 So anybody that would like to can just

- 1 come on up to the podium.
- MS. ANDERSON: Good morning. This is
- 3 Mary Anderson from PG&E, speaking on behalf of
- 4 the California Investor-Owned Utilities. I am
- 5 pleased to be here today to strongly support the
- 6 Energy Commission as you're proposing to
- 7 implement the expanded general service lamp
- 8 definitions into the Title 20, California
- 9 Appliance Efficiency Regulations.
- 10 The California IOUs and the Energy
- 11 Commission have a long history of working
- 12 together to promote high efficiency lighting
- 13 products in California, going back to the 2006
- 14 GSL state standards which laid the framework for
- 15 the lighting provision in the 2007 Energy
- 16 Independence and Security Act, or EISA.
- 17 Per the recommendations of the California
- 18 Energy Commission, I see it included a provision
- 19 that allowed California and Nevada to adopt the
- 20 federal backstop of 45 lumens per watt for GSLs
- 21 as of January 1st, 2018. After California
- 22 adopted this federal backstop, DOE, through a
- 23 proper rulemaking process, expanded the
- 24 definitely of GSL to included additional lamp
- 25 types. California is expressly permitted to

- 1 adopt these definitions under the statute and now
- 2 acts to do so.
- 3 Not only does the Energy Commission have
- 4 the right to adopt the expanded scope now, it is
- 5 imperative that it do so expeditiously to lock in
- 6 energy savings for Californians. In doing so,
- 7 California will be joining four other states,
- 8 Vermont, Colorado, Washington and Nevada, who
- 9 have already adopted the expanded definition into
- 10 state law. Of the anticipated 12.7 quadrillion
- 11 BTUs, or quads, of nationwide energy savings
- 12 afforded by the implementation of the full
- 13 expanded scope, backstop, and sales prohibition
- 14 on January 1, 2020, 1.4 quads, or 11 percent, of
- 15 the savings can be attributed to California alone
- 16 through the year 2050.
- 17 Further, our analysis strongly suggests
- 18 that the potential to achieve these savings is
- 19 front-loaded. If the California effective date
- 20 is delayed by just two years the 30-years savings
- 21 total will suffer a 21 percent loss through 2052.
- 22 The Energy Commission's adoption of these
- 23 regulations is of the utmost importance for
- 24 California, Californians, and has the potential
- 25 to influence the lighting market nationwide

- 1 through the promotion of money-saving efficient
- 2 products.
- 3 Thank you.
- 4 MS. FISHMAN: Is there anybody else who
- 5 wishes to present? No? Okay.
- If you would like to phone in, please use
- 7 the raise-hand feature now.
- 8 MR. BAEZ: Hi. This is Carlos from the
- 9 Appliance's Office also.
- 10 If you're connected via phone and can't
- 11 use the hand-raise feature, we're going to un-
- 12 mute everyone for a second. And if you have a
- 13 comment, please, you may begin your comment.
- So, here, I'll un-mute everyone now.
- MR. DELFORGE: So this is Pierre
- 16 Delforge. Can you hear me?
- MR. BAEZ: Hi, Pierre. Yeah, we can hear
- 18 you.
- 19 MR. DELFORGE: Okay. Great. Thank you.
- 20 So, good morning. My name is Pierre Delforge
- 21 with the Natural Resources Defense Council.
- I am here to comment today that the CEC's
- 23 propose almost doubles the number of
- 24 (indiscernible) at homes that are covered by the
- 25 state's lighting efficiency standards. With these

- 1 proposals, key categories of lightbulbs,
- 2 including three-way bulbs, (indiscernible) bulbs,
- 3 candle- and flame-shaped bulbs, and round globe
- 4 bulbs are brought into scope and subject to a
- 5 minimum efficiency standard of 45 lumens per
- 6 watt. This action will save massive amounts of
- 7 electricity weight and (indiscernible) a lot of
- 8 air pollution. According to CEC estimates,
- 9 California consumers and businesses will save
- 10 between \$700 million and \$2.4 billion a year
- 11 while the whole stock turns over.
- 12 Controversy statements often made by some
- 13 interested stakeholders, these bulbs are common
- 14 everyday lightbulbs, not some sort of niche or
- 15 specialty bulb. Today, energy versions for each
- 16 of these type of bulbs are widely available in a
- 17 variety of shapes and brightness levels.
- 18 (Indiscernible) use only one-sixth of the amount
- 19 of energy to deliver the same amount of light as
- 20 (indiscernible) conventional bulbs and they last
- 21 ten years or longer as a normal operation. The
- 22 results are extremely cost effective and the
- 23 slightly higher purchase price is typically paid
- 24 back within six months.
- 25 So for this, we urge the CEC to move

- 1 forward with this proposal and to adopt it at the
- 2 next business meeting.
- 3 Thank you.
- 4 MR. BAEZ: Thank you, Pierre.
- 5 Anyone else on the phone line that would
- 6 like to make a comment?
- 7 (Pause)
- 8 MR. BAEZ: All right. I'm about to un-
- 9 mute -- or mute all the lines. But again, if you
- 10 have a comment you'd like to make, use the hand-
- 11 raise feature through WebEx, or you could type

- 13 MS. FISHMAN: Okay. If no one has a
