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4	HEARING OFFICER COCHRAN: Good afternoon.
5	This is Susan.
6	I'm sorry.
7	We're going to be starting now.
8	COMMISSIONER McALLISTER: Maybe I can have a
9	microphone over here.
10	HEARING OFFICER COCHRAN: Sure. I think it will
11	reach.
12	COMMISSIONER McALLISTER: Greetings everyone.
13	How many people do we have on here?
14	HEARING OFFICER COCHRAN: Three.
15	COMMISSIONER McALLISTER: Just a few. Okay.
16	Welcome to the
17	Huntington Beach Energy Project Committee Meeting.
18	This is a closed session, but of course, as a
19	notice of session, there's a chance for public comment.
20	I'm Andrew McAllister. I'm the lead commissioner
21	on HBEP case (verbatim).
22	Let's see. I won't go around the room here.
23	At this point, I'll consider the hearing the
24	committee meeting open and pass it to Susan Cochran, the
25	hearing officer.

1 HEARING OFFICER COCHRAN: Thank you very much. 2 We're here today to meet on the 3 Huntington Beach Energy Project. The agenda is divided into four parts. 4 Commissioner McAllister has already opened the meeting. 5 We'll now take public comments. б 7 At that point, there will be a closed session, and finally, the meeting will open again in open session 8 to announce the conclusion of the closed session and 9 adjourn (verbatim). 10 I see we have a few folks on the line. I 11 12 recognize Melissa Foster who is counsel for AES Southland, 13 the applicant. Ms. Foster, do you have any comments that you'd 14 15 like to share with the committee at this time? 16 ATTORNEY FOSTER: I do not. I'm just monitoring 17 the public comment. 18 HEARING OFFICER COCHRAN: Thank you very much. We have two call-in users who are not identified. 19 20 What I'm going to do is I'm going to mute call-in user five so that, if someone could identify 21 22 themselves, we'll know who you are. 23 MR. MAINLAND: My name is Edward Mainland, and 24 I'm a ratepayer in PG&G territory from Novato, California. 25 HEARING OFFICER COCHRAN: Mr. Mainland, could you

1 spell your last name for us, please? 2 MR. MAINLAND: M-a-i-n-l-a-n-d. 3 HEARING OFFICER COCHRAN: Thank you very much. Did you have any comments that you wish to offer 4 5 today? б MR. MAINLAND: Yes, I do. 7 My comments are as follows: 8 I'd like to, first of all, call the Commission's 9 attention to a filing by James Stewart on October 24th 10 that lays out ten reasons why this energy project should not be approved (verbatim). 11 12 Among the ten reasons I'd like to highlight are 13 the facts that it is totally illogical at a time when 14 we're trying to reduce greenhouse gases to put more dirty 15 fuel, gas-fired plants onto the grid. There are alternatives, and the alternatives are 16 17 a whole suite of new energy-paradigm solutions -efficiency, conservation, storage, demand reduction, CHP, 18 smart web, microgrids (verbatim). These tools are coming 19 20 along rapidly. They are affordable. They are now 21 competitive. They will be demonstrated as implementable 22 and usable and reliable in short order certainly within a few years of the construction of this plant, which will 23 24 become obsolete and a burden to ratepayers (verbatim). 25 The other thing -- the final thing I'd like to б

note is that in consideration of this plant the whole problem of methane leakage hasn't been addressed -methane leakage in the production of natural gas, the distribution of the natural gas, and the use of the natural gas in this plant -- so there are alternatives available, and you haven't looked at all the drawbacks that this plant will make.

8 Thank you very much.

9 HEARING OFFICER COCHRAN: Thank you very much. 10 I'm now going to mute you, and I am unmuting the

15 This is Jim Stewart.

16 I wanted to ask if the commissioners will have a 17 chance to consider the comments that I submitted on Friday, and also, I wanted to call attention to the fact 18 19 that I did submit just an hour ago some support for one of the comments that I made about the Cal ISO peak load. I 20 submitted the Cal ISO data chart which shows that, indeed, 21 there's been a decline in the peak load in California over 22 23 the past eight years since 2006 and that the Cal ISO peak load is the same now as it was in 1998 and the 24 commission -- the proposed decision says that there's 25

1 expected to be more growth in electricity because of 2 increased economic and population growth, and I did the 3 calculation. There's been a 16 percent population growth 4 increase in California since 1998. If the electricity 5 peak demands we're tracking -- the increase in population growth -- it would be 16 percent higher (verbatim). That б 7 is flat. I didn't do the calculation on how much economic 8 growth has been in the last 16 years since 1998, but it's probably -- our GNP has doubled or something like that 9 10 (verbatim).

Clearly, what is so exciting about this is the 11 success, and I got to compliment the CEC on all of its 12 13 amazing energy-efficiency regulations that you guys have 14 been putting in over the last 16 years. They're working; 15 therefore, as the previous speaker said, there's no need 16 for this plant. We could save huge amounts of general --17 greenhouse gases if we used the readily available and economically beneficial and environmentally sound 18 19 alternatives.

HEARING OFFICER COCHRAN: Thank you very much.I'm going to mute you again.

Is there anyone in the room who would like to offer public comment?

24 INTERVENOR RUDMAN: All right.

5 This is Monica Rudman.

I grew up in Huntington Beach, lived there most of my teen years until I went away to college and then occasionally went back, and my mother still lives there; so I have an interest in Huntington Beach. I also work as an energy specialist at the Energy Commission but do not represent the Energy Commission in this.

Again, I urge the committee to consider my testimony and evidence that I submitted, and I believe this demonstrates that this project is really not a good outcome for the people of Huntington Beach, and so I really urge you to take a look at that.

17 In addition, I proposed some conditions of 18 certification in my response to the presiding members' 19 proposed decision that I think would be helpful in 20 mitigating the impacts, and I urge you to consider those 21 as well.

22 Thank you.

23 HEARING OFFICER COCHRAN: Thank you.

24 Anyone else?

25 Staff?

3 HEARING OFFICER COCHRAN: At this point, we will4 adjourn to closed session.
