With me this morning 7 is Commissioner Janea Scott, who is our Presiding Member. 8 Why don't I just take roll, and just roll through 9 it? 10 COMMITTEE MEMBER SCOTT: Okay. That's fine. 11 HEARING OFFICER KRAMER: Okay. And we have in the 12 room our court reporter, Michelle Chester, Shawn Pittard, 13 and Kerry Willis from Staff, and a gentleman who's going to 14 make a public comment, and that's it. 15 So let's see who's on the telephone. I saw Ellison Folk for the City of Oxnard; correct? 16 17 MS. FOLK: Yes, I'm here. HEARING OFFICER KRAMER: Okay. Anyone from the 18 19 Environmental Coalition, Environmental Defense Center, and 20 Sierra Club? Okay. 21 Robert Sarvey? 22 Kristy Chew just joined us, one of the Commissioner's Advisers. 23 CEJA, Ms. Limon or Ms. Lazerow? 24 25 Center for Biological Diversity?

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    Director of Environmental Services for NRG is on. And I'm
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not sure if Dawn Gleiter, the Project Director from NRG, is 2 on, but she may join us later if she's not on yet. She's 3 also joined us, Dawn Gleiter, Project Director for the 4 Puente Project with NRG Energy. 5 HEARING OFFICER KRAMER: Okay. Thank you all. 6 Today's meeting is primarily for the purpose of continued 7 Committee deliberations in closed session. But as we do for 8 each of these continued Committee conferences, we take 9 public comment. 10 Go ahead and mute everyone on the phone for the 11 moment. 12 Our first request to speak was from V. John White 13 of CEERT. So if you want to come to the -- have a seat, 14 actually, and turn on one of the microphones. And we will be 15 limiting comments to three minutes today. 16 MR. WHITE: Thank you, Commissioner, and Mr. 17 Officer. My name is John White. I'm with the Center for 18 Energy Efficiency and Renewable Technologies. And I thank 19 you for the opportunity to speak. I realize that the 20 Committee is facing significant challenge in terms of 21 weighing a number of issues. 22 I just wanted to point out a relatively new 23 development that was announced yesterday by -- in Los Angeles. The Department of Water and Power has decided to 24

forego or delay the repowering of a couple of its large in-

basin gas plants. This is because of the rapid improvement in technologies that enable them to visualize the possibility of keeping the lights on in the heart of their load center with less combustion of gas than they originally thought they would need.

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The other thing that is important about that is that even though L.A. has had a relatively strong presence with respect to both in-basin gas, as well as imported coal, they're moving rapidly in a different direction. And they have a very energized, integrated resource plan.

They also have adapted some new technologies that I think this Commission has been aware of, because there was a tour of their facilities in Southern California basically illustrated their use of clutches on their power plants to enable them to get voltage support and synchronous condensers without burning gas. This is a very -- it's a standard the that General Electric offers. But this is the kind of thinking that goes into the City of Oxnard's alternative. And we just would urge the Committee to keep its eyes and ears open to all the new developments and new technologies that we have an opportunity to deploy. Thank you.

HEARING OFFICER KRAMER: Thank you.

Let's go to the two people who had previously said
they wanted to make a public comment on the telephone. First

was Mayor Pro Tem Carmen Ramirez.

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MAYOR PRO TEM RAMIREZ: Good morning. I've un-muted myself. Can you hear me now?

HEARING OFFICER KRAMER: We can. Thanks.

MAYOR PRO TEM RAMIREZ: Okay. I'm out on the water (phonetic) here, so I hope that there's no extra noise. Good morning, and thank you for this opportunity.

We're here at a very important time for our City of Oxnard, our people, and actually for California and the world. And I always like to think in the decisions I make as an elected official for our city, how will I be remembered for the decisions I make every day, small and large, for the future of my city, the health of my people, the health of my community and my planet?

Yesterday, or a couple days ago, you heard multiple public comments urging the Commission to accept California ISO's offer to evaluate clean energy alternatives to repowering the once-through cooling facility that has long burdened the City of Oxnard with the proposed Puente Project. On the very same day as the Committee -- Commission -- Committee deliberated, the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power took action on its review of its own once-through cooling plant. As set forth in the L.A. Department of Water and Power Board presentation, the city docketed this proceeding on Tuesday, rather than repower these

facilities as originally intended, the DWP has now put all 2 planned re-powering projects on hold until additional 3 analysis is conducted to identify all viable alternatives to 4 new gas plant development. 5 We ask the Committee and the Commission to treat 6 the people of Oxnard with the same consideration the LADWP 7 is treating the people of Los Angeles. The time to look past 8 fossil fuels to clean energy alternatives is long overdue. 9 The DWP has recognized this, and the California Energy Commission should, as well. The world is counting on 10 11 California, our Commission, our leaders in the energy scene 12 which is changing drastically. Our task is simple, very 13 simple, we must consider all alternatives and we must think of the future. 14 15 Thank you very much. 16 HEARING OFFICER KRAMER: Thank you. 17 Next was Susan Jordan. 18 MS. JORDAN: Yeah. Hi. I un-muted. Can you hear me? HEARING OFFICER KRAMER: Yes. 19 20 MS. JORDAN: Okay. Great. Susan Jordan. I'm the 21 Executive Director of the California Coastal Protection Network. I have a long history of working with the Oxnard 22 2.3 community as part of my statewide work. 24 I want to urge the Committee to accept CAISO's 25 offer to conduct an alternatives study. Far from the delay

tactic, this study -- I mean, a mere four weeks is not a 2 long time in the scheme of things. And this study represents 3 a prudent and reasonable step forward. Just as the LADWP announced its decision to put it 4 5 on hold, its \$2.2 billion plan to rebuild several old 6 natural gas power plants, while it conducts an analysis of 7 clean energy alternatives to meet electricity demands, the 8 CEC, too, has an opportunity here, a very significant 9 opportunity to accept CAISO's offer to do a similar 10 alternatives analysis for the proposed Puente Project. 11 Oxnard has long shouldered an inordinate and unfair burden of polluting infrastructure. And it's time to 12 consider alternatives that may be available that could meet 13 14 electricity demand while moving closer to the clean energy future we all embrace. 15 16 So in closing, I would really like to thank the 17 Committee for its due diligence and its serious 18 consideration of CAISO's offer. And I urge the Committee and 19 the CEC to accept it.

Thank you so much.

21 HEARING OFFICER KRAMER: Thank you.

We have nobody new in the room to make a public comment.

Does anyone else on the telephone wish to make a public comment?

MR. CARROLL: Mr. Kramer, this is Michael Carroll on behalf of the applicant. It's not a public comment, but I would like to make just a brief comment related to the LADWP presentation at an appropriate time.

HEARING OFFICER KRAMER: Okay. Let's see if we've got any more public comments, and then we'll go to you.

Does anyone else on the telephone wish to make a public comment? Okay.

Mr. Carroll?

MR. CARROLL: Just very briefly. I wanted to point out, in light of the docketing of the LADWP presentation and the comments that were made this morning that, and I'm sure this is obvious to the Committee, but the situation within the LADWP territory is obviously very different than the situation in the Oxnard region.

I would also point out that the LADWP, just to be clear about they're doing, is that they are undertaking an analysis of their future plans. The options that might come out of that analysis. And at page eight of their presentation they explicitly state that one of the possible outcomes is a repowering of the OTC units as originally planned.

So I just want to be clear that there has been no decision on the part of LADWP, whether that's relevant or not. But there's been no decision on the part of LADWP to

not move forward with the gas-fired plant as originally 2 planned, only to undertake and analysis of those plans and 3 to look at alternatives. And we certainly agree that alternatives should be evaluated. We think that they have 4 5 been evaluated in this case. 6 And the last thing that I would point out is that 7 study that LADWP intends to undertake is expected to extend 8 well into next year. 9 So I just wanted to highlight a couple of points, 10 given that some of the parties seem to think that the study 11 on the part of LADWP is relevant to these proceedings, which 12 we don't, but we just wanted to make sure that things were 1.3 clear. 14 HEARING OFFICER KRAMER: Okay. 15 MR. CARROLL: Thank you. 16 HEARING OFFICER KRAMER: Thank you. 17 With that, we are going to -- hold on a second. 18 I'm going to see if I can get a return time. 19 (Colloquy between Hearing Officer Kramer and 20 Commissioner Scott) 21 HEARING OFFICER KRAMER: Okay. We're going to 22 adjourn to closed session pursuant to Government Code -- I 2.3 should remember that by now -- 11126(c)(3) which allows a 24 state body, including a delegated Committee, to hold a 25 closed session to deliberate on a decision to be made --

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reached in a proceeding that we are required by law to
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   conduct.
              We're going to return no earlier than 9:20. That's
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   our target to report out the results of the closed session.
