The State should conduct an in-depth, data-driven study in consultation with local business chambers, CBOs, technical assistance providers (such as small business development centers and the Office of Small Business Advocate) and small businesses to determine actions for increasing contracting opportunities for small businesses in low-income and disadvantaged communities. A potential scope of this work is provided in Appendix C.

- Focus on action items and solutions that may be implemented in the near term
- Leverage any lessons learned from previous experience and existing programs to increase opportunities/access for small businesses in disadvantaged communities



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- What are the best metrics that should be used to track progress on small business contracting in disadvantaged communities? How do we move beyond just dollars received to address tech assistance, small business development needs, and access to credit?
- What lessons can we learn from existing programs that have shown success in engaging with small business in disadvantaged communities?
- How can existing California small business contracting policies be best modified to further benefit local small businesses in low-income and disadvantaged communities?
