Please provide a clean version of the Power Source Disclosure regulations you are amending under 16-OIR-05 Power Source Disclosure - AB 1110 Implementation Rulemaking.

What I mean by a clean version is, no cross outs, underlines. Only show the regulation as it would be when enacted.

The current version appears to not be good writing. From the claimed section numbers (Sections 1390 through 1394) to referencing non existent paragraphs to the use of "%" when "percent" should be used. It is difficult to follow what you are trying to say in TN227114 Power Source Disclosure Draft Regulations.

There are legal grounds for "good writing." <u>California Government Code</u> <u>Section 6219</u> says:

"6219. (a) Each department, commission, office, or other administrative agency of state government shall write each document that it produces in plain, straightforward language, avoiding technical terms as much as possible, and using a coherent and easily readable style.

(b) As used in this section, a "state agency document" means any contract, form, license, announcement, regulation, manual, memorandum, or any other written communication that is necessary to carry out the agency responsibilities under the law."

Furthermore, public funds pay for the reports produced by the Energy Commission. Hence, the public deserves the best document for its money. It deserves reports, papers, or presentations that are clear and well-written.
