Beyond what Dan has to tell you, there are numerous former and current waterbird breeding colonies within a 6 mile radius of that location. You can use the map on this webpage to see the locations, species, and which years had confirmed breeding: <https://colonialwaterbirdprogram.weebly.com/science.html>

The waterways support many species of waterfowl and shorebirds. I can chat with you about that if you're interested.

The ponds and property of the San Jose-Santa Clara Wastewater Facility support shorebirds and also raptors. During our single-day survey last November, we observed 2 Golden eagles, 11 red-tailed hawks, 3 northern harriers, 1 white-tailed kite, 8 turkey vultures, and also shorebirds.
