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Public Comment

• Fabi Lao, senior equity policy manager for Center for Sustainable Energy (CSE) – highlighted the need for community engagement as a principle and funded component in the program, include STEP metrics, stressed measurement is possible, type of activities and engagement CBOs, research, satisfaction surveys canvassing, listening sessions and focus groups.

DACAG Member Discussion:

- On the PA Proposed Equity Indicators slide, please explain what "energy and climate benefits (monetized within TSB)" means in greater detail. TSB = total system benefit.
- What kinds of public facilities have been suggested to include in hard to reach places? School districts, water wastewater, publicly funded facilities.
- Recommended expanding definition of disadvantaged communities within the equity segment
 for both IOUs and CCAs and RENs, to include both the California EPA's Final Designation of
 Disadvantaged Communities Pursuant to SB 535, published in May of 2022, and this Advisory
 Group's Equity Framework Definition of Disadvantaged Communities as: CalEnviroScreen (already
 included), Tribal Lands, Census tracts with area median household income/state median income, less
 than 80%, and Households with median household income less than 80% of Area Median Income
 (AMI), as listed in the 2018 Equity Framework.
- Draft equity metrics and indicators presented as totals, interested in percentages, annual metrics, savings, others. Reach of the program in relation to the total population not currently included, but can be explored. Analogy with CARE and FERA (sp?) programs.
- Non-energy benefits, health, comfort, safety should be the metrics to be focus on, regardless of
 difficulties in quantification and definitions, etc. Echo prior comments of working with CBOs. Both
 consistent asks. Cost effectiveness tests should be revised to incorporate nebs equity carve out is
 productive, and a parallel revised cost effectiveness test incorporating non energy benefits; don't put
 NEBS on 'the kids table'. For the 30%, RENs are the only exceptions. More ambitious, add budget floor
 for equity, at 30% as the ceiling is 50%.
- Question about ending incentives for natural gas infrastructure, provide more detail. Rationale is to not perpetuate higher cost and other issues with NG infrastructure
- Related question on non-energy benefits (NEBS) what is the CPUC role in NEBS? Warrants full discussion at future meeting DACAG agenda item.
- Process for addressing recommendations, responding to comments from a specific working group (e.g., DACAG). Up to Administrative Law Judge, allow to go on the record, and request direct response to letter or more general response. Intent is to give comments full consideration.
- Recommend setting minimum equity budget requirements equity investments seemed very low in some entities draft proposals and higher in others.
- Several years ago, the DACAG has already developed an Equity Framework to help shape these kinds
 of programs. How can consideration of those recommended guidelines be institutionalized, so that we
 can be more efficient with our time.

ITEM 5, Draft Letter to CPUC regarding Clean Energy Financing Proposals

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Public Comment:

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DACAG Member Discussion:

- Need to make sure the application process is as simple as possible
- Is there potential for alternative ownership models, for example community ownership of certain kinds of assets?
- Recommendation to make available the ability to combine different technology types under a single OBF agreement – benefits residential, commercial, and communities. Also include technologies beyond just EE – include clean generation and storage technologies, and system components related to these i.e. electrical panel upgrades.
- Many proposals wanted to test out models on higher income customers before opening up to lower income customers will exclude the customers that stand to benefit the most.

- Need to ensure programs include protections for customers at risk of potential disconnection due to nonpayment of financing charges. Better to include low income customers in first year of programs with financial protections, than to exclude them altogether as many have proposed.
- Language used to communicate with customers must be clear and protect against landlords who may want to upgrade their property and pass costs along to tenants. Both landlord and tenant must expressly consent to the financing mechanism.
- Technical assistance should be provided to tenants and landlords both for education and adoption and for quality assurance, including bill savings for the resident.
- Credit histories and income ratios should not be considered in application process consider instead utility bill payment history, with thoughtful consideration of any arrearages accumulated during COVID, and sufficient ability to pay monthly bills associated with OBF.
- Expand OBF to include zero interest unsecured loan terms with no application fees.
- Do not disqualify applicants who have had a previous disconnection or default would exclude the customers who need affordable financing the most. Especially if the disconnection/default happened during COVID.
- Landlords should be responsible for out of pocket expenses beyond those mutually agreed to, including operations and maintenance, warranty work, copays, etc.
- Unless otherwise specified, all recommendations apply to tariffed on-bill financing, on-bill financing, on bill repayment and other forms of financing, and to residential and nonresidential settings. Residential includes but single-family homes, multi-family homes, rental accounts. Non-Residential includes industrial, commercial, government, non-profit, and other non-residential buildings or community-scale systems
