7 some headsets. Do you want to repeat that? 8 MR. OCHOA: Hola, buenas tardes, todos. 9 (Continues dialogue in Spanish). 10 MS. CARRILLO: Thank you, Maximiliano. We'll just -- anyone need headsets? Okay. Then we're going 11 12 to go ahead and get started. I appreciate your 13 patience. We are starting a little later just to give 14 folks some time to get back home from work, and I 15 appreciate your patience as we've done that. 16 My name is Deana, and myself plus a few other 17 folks who are in the room are here with the Energy

18 Commission, which is supporting the Blue Ribbon

19 Commission on lithium extraction. Welcome. And if we 20 could go to the next slide? Thank you.

21 So, a few housekeeping items. This meeting --22 this is a public meeting, and we're transcribing it so 23 that the Lithium Valley Commissioners and the public 24 have access to your comments and your feedback as part 25 of the record. And the CEC is going to be providing a

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1 summary of the information we collect in our group 2 discussions, and providing it to the Commission on the 3 Commission's docket. Docket -- a docket might be a new 4 word for you. It was a new word for me, and that is an 5 online source of all of the information that the Blue 6 Ribbon Commission has been collecting in its work over 7 the last two years.

8 And at the back of the room, you will find 9 several resources in English and Spanish, and there is 10 some material also in Purepecha. There's factsheets, 11 copies of the statute, copies of the report, the 12 executive summary, and importantly for tonight, there's 13 a workshop workbook that we've handed out for folks to 14 help quide the conversation tonight, and as a resource 15 for you.

16 It's nice to see some familiar faces, 17 especially over the last couple days. I've had a chance 18 to meet several of you over the last several months as 19 we've been down here. And some of you may have some 20 specific questions for tonight, or might not have had a 21 chance to read the report. And I just want to emphasize 22 that tonight, the goal is to get oral feedback from 23 community members on this draft report of the Blue 24 Ribbon Commission.

So, I appreciate that some questions may rise,

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and we'll be taking them back to the Blue Ribbon
 Commission. I encourage you to use the comment forms in
 your workshop workbook, and we'll also have more forms
 if you need them. And again, we're focusing on
 soliciting comments on the draft report. The public
 comment period ends on October 28th, which is next
 Friday.

8 And this is one of three workshops we've had 9 over the last three days. On Tuesday we were in Niland, 10 yesterday we were in North Shore, and tonight we get to 11 join you here. So, thank you.

12 Next slide, please.

13 This is the agenda for today's meeting. I'm 14 going to provide a brief overview of the state's Lithium 15 Valley vision, and an overview of the report for those 16 new to the conversation. And we'll spend most of our 17 time in a group discussion soliciting feedback on that 18 draft report and those recommendations. There are 44 19 recommendations currently in the draft report under 20 consideration. And while we've organized the 21 conversation around those recommendations, we welcome 22 feedback on any parts of the report.

23 So really, kind of the big questions that 24 we're asking today, you know, in that report what did 25 the Commission get right? What could be different?

What needs to be added?

2 Alright, let's get started. Next slide,3 please.

4 Let's dive into a brief background to what led5 us to today. Next slide.

6 So, what is lithium? Lithium is a naturally 7 occurring soft, silverly, white metal that is an 8 essential part of lithium-ion batteries for consumer 9 products. So, our cell phones, our computers, electric 10 vehicles, and battery storage and energy storage 11 systems. Again, it's naturally occurring, it's a key 12 material to the nation and the world making progress in 13 our climate goals, reducing greenhouse gas emissions and 14 improving air quality in our environment.

Next slide.

16 So, what is the Lithium Valley vision? 17 Lithium Valley is not a bound geographical area. Right? 18 We have Imperial Valley, we have Coachella Valley. 19 Lithium Valley is a term or a concept used to describe a 20 potential world class economic hub focused on the 21 recovery of lithium from geothermal brine in this 22 region. It's found one to two miles under the floor of 23 the Salton Sea at the southern southeast corner of the 24 Salton Sea. In a geothermal -- something called a Known 25 Geothermal Resource Area, or a KGRA.

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1 Next slide, please. 2 So, this opportunity led to the establishment of the Blue Ribbon Commission on lithium extraction in 3 4 California. 5 Next slide. 6 Authored by Assemblymember Eduardo Garcia, I 7 think I saw one of his staff members come in, thank you. 8 The Blue Ribbon Commission was created by AB, or 9 Assembly Bill 1657, and it was supported by four 10 legislative findings and recommendations. World demand 11 for lithium is expected to grow as much as tenfold in 12 the next decade, but virtually none of it is produced in 13 the United States today. The Salton Sea Geothermal 14 Resource Area, or KGRA, is well positioned to become a 15 competitive source of lithium that can satisfy more than 16 one third of today's development, and requires 17 investment and the removal of barriers. 18 And there's a national security rationale for 19 establishing this domestic supply of lithium. And that 20 opportunity for lithium recovery and production in the 21 state and here in the region has the potential to 22 unleash billions of dollars of new economic 23 infrastructure and development. 24 Next slide. Thanks, Erica. 25 The statute established specific requirements

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1 for each of the 14 Commissioners. It's a very diverse 2 group, which ensured a broad and diverse representation 3 of perspectives.

And next slide. 5 And specifically, the statue tasked the 6 Commission with reviewing, investigating, and analyzing 7 eight specific topics. These here are just summaries. 8 There's more detailed language in the statute, which you 9 can find in the back, as well as in the draft report. 10 After its review, the Commission is tasked with 11 providing a report to the legislature, with its 12 recommendations and its findings. Now, this report was 13 due on October 1st of this year, so we're several weeks 14 behind on that deadline. But that was an intentional 15 delay. The Blue Ribbon Commission extended its meetings 16 to incorporate additional community feedback and tribal 17 feedback prior to developing the draft.

18 Next slide.

19 So, while many of you may be new to the topic 20 of the Blue Ribbon Commission, it has had over 21 public 21 meetings to discuss these issues. Most of them were 22 virtual. The first community workshop happened in 23 November 2020, and then the pandemic hit and then 24 activities moved virtual. And once we were able, the 25 meetings have been held at physical locations locally,

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mostly in the fence line communities of Niland,
 Westmorland, Calipatria, as well as Thermal, and at
 Imperial Valley College.

Next slide.

5 So, this brings us to why we're here today, 6 the Commission's draft report, and its recommendations 7 to the legislature. The draft report, again, includes 8 44 recommendations for consideration. They cross over 9 the statutory requirements. And the Commission worked 10 to ground that report in the experience of residents in 11 Imperial and Coachella valleys. The report reflects the 12 discussion of these issues required under the law, and 13 also includes the Commission's focus to ensure community 14 and tribal voices are represented.

15

Next slide.

16 So, this slide tells us a little bit about the 17 timetable for the for the next steps of the report. The 18 public comment runs through October 28th. The Blue 19 Ribbon Commission asked that we host these community 20 meetings to get oral feedback on the report for those 21 that might not be familiar with a docket, or might not 22 be able to participate online during working hours. And 23 then the Commission will meet on October 31^{st} , it will be 24 a virtual meeting to discuss and consider comments on 25 the draft report, provide the Energy Commission with

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1 some direction. And then the final report is 2 anticipated to be released in November for the Blue 3 Ribbon Commission's consideration on November 17th, 4 ideally to be submitted on December 1^{st} is the plan. 5 (Ouestion from the audience) 6 I'm sorry, I can't hear you. 7 (Question from the audience) 8 The slide will be online, we'll post it. But 9 we didn't bring copies. Good question. If you want to 10 take a picture, we can go back to the timeline. 11 (Question from the audience) 12 Come on up, there's plenty of room. Okay. 13 Yeah, can you go back? 14 (Ouestion from the audience) 15 Were you looking for the timeline? 16 (Question from the audience) 17 The website link isn't up here, but actually 18 why don't you move forward a few times. That's where 19 you can get information on the docket. Was that your 20 question? 21 (Question from the audience) 22 So, the question for our court reporter Yeah. 23 is whether we have this power point presentation printed 24 out? And the answer is no, it'll be on the website. 25 (Ouestion from the audience)

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Yeah. Yup. Okay. So, that leads us to slide
 15. Okay.

3 So again, the goal today is to get feedback on 4 the draft report. And to do that, we're going to have 5 small group discussions. And so, what we would like to 6 do -- and these are the topics that we have in the draft 7 report -- is if those community members, if we could go 8 ahead and coalesce around these two tables and the back 9 two tables, and we'll have a conversation about the 10 report to get your oral feedback.

II Great. And I see -- before we get started, I want to introduce Lisa Ballin, who is a third-party facilitator to help us today. And I did see that you had your camera up, do you want us to pull back to a different slide? No? Okay. Okay.

16 So, I'll introduce Lisa, and Lisa I'm going to 17 hand you this phone. I know it's a small group, it 18 feels weird to have a microphone. But this is for the 19 public record.

MS. BALLIN: Thanks, Deana. I'm wondering if we might be able to have everybody in one group around a table? Can every-- can we have people raise hands if you're here tonight to give some comments in the discussion period, just to see how many people want to participate in that? Because I know we have some people

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here to just listen. So, it sounds like we've only got
 a few.

3 I was wondering if we could see if everybody 4 would fit around either -- maybe these two tables would 5 be -- which would be -- would it be better to be closer 6 to you, Leticia? Or would we be better closer to the -7 we're not court reporting. We can have everybody either 8 sit at the back two tables or sit at these two. And I 9 don't know if it's better to be closer to you? 10 Why don't we do that, because -- Okay. Let's 11 have everybody come together. We're all kind of 12 scattered, let's see if we can all like sit around these 13 tables? And that way we're a little closer, since we've 14 got this portable mic, we might as well make use of it. 15 Let's just see. Okay. Alright. Thanks so much. 16 (Begin Small Group Discussion, 6:25 P.M) 17 (End Small Group Discussion, 7:44 P.M.) 18 MS. CSERNANSKI: Okay. So, this is a summary 19 of the comments from our third community meeting on, you 20 know, to gather comments and recommendations on the 21 draft report to the Commission. So, we covered quite a

22 range of topics tonight, but definitely topics that

23 we've heard over the past two days.

So, we had comments specifically on Section E,
Number 1, as it relates to CEQA -- that that should

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1 include really robust notification of the community and 2 disclosures to the community about who is doing those 3 assessments and what exactly -- you know what 4 information comes as a result of those. So, really 5 transparent disclosures about those impact assessments 6 going to the community.

7 We also had comments on Section F as it 8 relates to environmental impact. Recommendations 2 and 9 3, that you know support for the notion that there 10 should be ongoing studies of the impact, not just kind 11 of short-term studies or initial studies. That these 12 are things that should be ongoing for the life of the 13 project.

14 We also had some more comments on Section F as 15 it relates to environmental concerns. Again, 16 Recommendations 2 and 3 -- who is going to be monitoring 17 those assessments? And specifically, that there's --18 that the permit language should be amended to include 19 already existing permits. Since one of the developers 20 already has a permit in process, that that 21 recommendation should retroactively apply to the 22 existing permit. 23 We also had comments on who will be 24 responsible for the impacts that may occur as a result

25 of the extraction. That, you know, so really wanting

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1 more disclosure as to who is going to be, you know, 2 providing the funds to mitigate those impacts, to pay 3 for the impact on community health or environmental 4 health.

5 And we also had a kind of general comment that 6 in ranking of the recommendations, that the public 7 health and the environmental health should be 8 prioritized. So, if we're going to look at the 9 recommendations as a whole, those that relate to public 10 health and environmental health should be a top priority 11 for the legislature as they move forward.

12 Let's see. We also had a general comment that 13 the use of analogies to explain topics was very 14 effective, and that this is part of that plain language 15 approach. A commitment to the community to make sure 16 that they understand the information that's being 17 presented to them, and that they really get a meaningful 18 you know disclosure in terms of what's going on in their 19 community, so that they're able to understand.

20 We also had support expressed for the 21 definition of the Salton Sea Region. We also had a 22 comment requesting that there be more numbers and kind 23 of specific information as it relates to those community 24 and labor benefit agreements. And we also had comments 25 on Section F in Workforce Development, as it relates to

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Recommendation Number 2, expressing kind of a preference
 for local labor over developers bringing in outside
 labor.

And again, kind of another comment under environmental impacts, that air quality and water quality impacts should be a primary concern, and that the monitoring should begin before permits are approved, ideally. And that mitigation efforts be included in that section.

10 And that was it.

11 MS. CARRILLO: I feel so far away. I really 12 appreciate you coming out tonight. I know lives are 13 busy, and so I appreciate you taking time out of your 14 day. We are going to go to next steps. And just, I 15 wanted to reinforce the timeline again so folks 16 understood the process. This next slide shows a 17 summary of the schedule. We'll continue -- we have one 18 more webinar seeking oral feedback from the report on 19 Monday, and then the public comment period runs through 20 next Friday, October 28th.

As our facilitators mentioned, they'll be summarizing the public comments today. If you have specific comments, you know, no one can put your comment in the right words beyond you, so we would suggest putting it into the docket directly if you'd prefer.

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1 And then this next slide shows where the 2 docket is to be able to provide some of the information 3 that folks have been asking for tonight. So, if you go 4 to your favorite search engine and search for the 5 California Energy Commission, and then search for 6 Lithium Valley Commission, you'll come to this page and 7 the docket is there in the right-hand corner, and you 8 can submit an e-comment.

9 And before we say goodbye for the evening, 10 again, just want to thank you again for your time, 11 because people are busy. And appreciate you taking time 12 out of your day. And also, want to thank Comite del 13 Civico for making all this happen, and supporting with 14 all of the outreach as well as Alianza, to let folks 15 know about this workshop and get input.

16 And so, with that we'll close for the evening.
17 And we appreciate your participation and the discussion.
18 Have a good night.
