Staff Workshop on the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant Program Funding Allocation from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009

The California Energy Commission staff will conduct workshops throughout the state for small cities and counties to discuss the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant Program (Block Grant) of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA). The workshops for small cities and counties include program description and objectives, funding sources, United States Department of Energy (DOE) and state legislative guidance, application process, specific program options, timelines for providing input into developing guidelines, and information sharing on partnership opportunities and technical assistance needs.

These workshops will inform the various stakeholders, specifically small cities and counties, of the Block Grant program elements and objectives, application processes, and timelines for developing guidelines and to afford opportunities for input. Specific program proposals, more detailed than in previous workshops, will be discussed to better understand the opportunities and issues with these proposals. Commission staff wants to understand how small jurisdictions plan to apply and use the funds. All six workshops will follow the same agenda and address the same topics.

The Energy Commission is receiving \$49.6 million for the Block Grant program through the ARRA. At least 60 percent of the funds from the program are to fund activities in small cities with populations less than 35,000 and counties with populations less than 200,000. Large cities and counties will apply directly to DOE for Block Grant funding with an application deadline of June 25, 2009.

Purpose

Staff will discuss DOE and state legislative guidance on funding, scope of program, and disbursing funds allocated to the State of California through the ARRA-related Block Grant funds.

The workshops will present a preliminary timeline for developing guidelines on program activities and project areas to be funded through the 60 percent small city and county allocation and also explore options for the remaining 40 percent the Energy Commission can use for broader energy-related activities.

Energy Commission staff will discuss:

- opportunities for, and roles of, partnerships among jurisdictions to develop projects for funding.
- criteria for dividing small jurisdiction funding into separate allocations. These may include reserving funds for jurisdictions based on size, location or geographic diversity and economic situation.
- the need for and availability of technical assistance to identify and develop information to submit projects for funding.
- the role of low interest Commission loans as a match for grant funds.
- unique challenges to program participation that jurisdictions may face.

Background

The ARRA will provide \$787 billion nationally in economic investment to jump start the economy and create jobs for Americans.

The Energy Commission is administering two programs, the State Energy Program for approximately \$226 million and the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant Program for approximately \$49.6 million. A third program, the Energy Efficient Appliance Rebate Program estimated at approximately \$30 million will be announced by DOE at a later time.

In addition, there is more than \$37 billion available nationwide that the United States Department of Energy (DOE) will administer through competitive grants and other financing for energy and climate change related programs. The Energy Commission will work with

other state agencies, utilities, and public and private entities to identify ways to leverage these funds for California projects.

Please note that other workshops will focus on guidelines and funding criteria for the State Energy Program (SEP) and the Energy Efficient Appliance Rebate Program. This workshop will focus specifically on Block Grant funds for small cities with a population less than 35,000 and counties with a population less than 200,000.
