At the Lancaster City Council meeting of Feb. 24,

RECD. MAR 172010 spokesperson for D.C.A.P. Lyle Talbot, alerted the members of the impending consequences should the City of Palmdale go fornard sith the planned poner plant to be built at Sierra Hsy. \& Ave. "M" (the Lancaster/Palmdale "Cactus Curtain") next to. AF Plant 42. Mayor Ledford plans to offer discounted energy to the aircraft industry and city residents. Palmdale became a Charter City at the last election and has applied to a state commission for permission become a "public utility" such as the Cities of Los Angehe and Burbank are so designated.

Mayor Ledford should consider the follosing points before further investing his City's funds:
( The Antelope Valley is the "Saudi Arabia" of $N$ ind and solar energy resources. A fact recognized by the energy industry. E Palmdale vill invest over \$1-billion on it's so-called eco-friendly, "hybrid", 570-meganatt, facility that is only 10\% solar poner and over nhelmingly, 90\% fossil fuel (natural gas) with all the related noxious fumes - unlike wind and solar. - Lancaster residents will become the "donn-winders" of noxious off-gases because of the Valley's prevailing South West vinds. - The Antelope Valley Air Quality District (AVAQMD) office has confirmed the plant will become the largest source of air pollution in our "shared" valley. Calculated on a scale of "10" it nould probably be rated an "11"...plus!
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While currently plant 42 is considered to be the largest, single source, on a scale of "10" it is only about a "5".
( So combining the $t_{\text {no }}$ sources ne will have a "mega-number".
Palmdale may be able to sell it's poner at a cheaper rate than Edison if the Califoria Public Utilities Commission (PUC) grants them such authority. It may not be a certainty.

Gov. Schnarzenegger has decreed that all the State's public utilities must meet a $33 \%$ goal to use renewable energy sources (solar and wind) by the year 2013, in an effort to end reliance on fossil fuel. As of February 2010 So. Cal Edison has already attained about $16 \%$ of that goal so the demand for fossil-fueled plants could diminish in the long run.

California presently uses only about $80 \%$ of the available energy capacity and with the Governor's mandate, some fossil fuel plants may have to come off line. There is no shortage at this time and that could be expressed as a $20 / 0$ surplus. - Also the price of natural gas sill continue to rise and it has been highly, volatile over the past five years.

Why should Palmdale "buck" the trend when there are so many natural and sustainable resources here in the Valley?
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Why nould the taxpayers of Palmdale risk their money on such a speculative venture when demand for fossil-fuel plants could possibly be on the decline?
\# Why subject your "Sister City", Lancaster and outlying areas to the North and East to so much added pollution?

Will the $t_{N}$ Palmdale members on the Antelope Valley $A Q M D$ vote for more pollution, despite knowing that it will cause even more asthma problems for the many children in Lancaster and the entire Valley? Will they? It remains to be seen. Isn't the fugitive dust in our valley bad enough already? Nithout adding noxious gases to the atmosphere?

Palmdale has committed $\$ 9.1$ million to extended the "purple pipeline" recycled sener vater from Lancaster to it's poner plant. Some of that sener Nater is from Palmdale's housing developments on the north/nest side of ton which uses the Lancaster senage treatment plant.

Hon many dollar\$ has Palmdale spent already sith Inland Energy, for, permits and plans to buy (what may turn out to be a "pig in a poke")?

Why not join Lancaster in promoting more wind, and solar projects such as E-Solar which is only 6 miles up Sierra HNy. - In the Valley Press article Nov. 29) Business Editor, Jim Skeen quoted Mayor Ledford: "The poner plant is the key to creating more jobs and opportunity at Plant 42." DCAP feels that is more more about Palmdale raising revenue for the City's coffers as sales tax revenue is nay donn from the glory days.

Also, if it turns out there is a diminishing demand for fossil-fueled energy in the state, Pamdale's Mayor Ledford may be placing his City's sager on the a losing pony in the California "Energy Derby".
