

Dear Energy Commission and/or To Whom It May Concern:

I wish to express my feelings on living next to San Onofre. I do not feel safe. I am 70 years old and if there were a cause for evacuation due to radiation contamination, I would be in a difficult situation trying to recover, especially financially. I do not have a significant retirement--I live on Social Security and on my personal savings. I regard my home as my financial security for my declining years. Therefore, the risks that this plant has are just too great. A large percentage of San Clemente and the surrounding area is inhabited by retirees like myself who really cannot afford the dangerous consequences of San Onofre.

I have lived here for 22 years and, although I never really liked San Onofre being nearby. (Moving from PA, I did not realize until the day of escrow that it was that close). With the whistle blowing incidents, in which transparency was definitely discouraged, if not squelched and with reprimands assigned, and with the newest news of the radiation possibilities in the movement of the storage tanks, to name just two concerns of many I have, I would hope that the license of San Onofre is rescinded and soon. It should definitely not be renewed in view of its location on a serious fault line and in view of what happened in Japan. Yes, it could happen here--maybe not in the same exact way, but in very similar circumstances, with serious repercussions, and in a heavily populated area.
