**Re: Docket # 10-BSTD-01  
Building Energy Efficiency Standards Acceptance Testing and Documentation**

Dear Commissioners:

I write on behalf of the California Association of Sheet Metal and Air Conditioning Contractors' National Association (CAL SMACNA) and our 600 contractor members statewide in strong **opposition** to any proposal that could serve to narrow or limit the responsibility for acceptance testing and documentation to only those individuals and companies who are certificated by the Associated Air Balance Council (AABC), National Environmental Balancing Bureau (NEBB), or the Testing Adjusting and Balancing Bureau (TABB).

First, due to correspondence generated to the California Energy Commission in recent months, we believe it is necessary to clear-up any confusion that may exist about the relationship between CAL SMACNA and the Joint Committee on Energy and Environmental Policy (JCEEP). We wish to clarify that CAL SMACNA has not been associated with JCEEP since December 31, 2010. As such, CAL SMACNA is not to be confused as a participant in JCEEP's various positions related to the proposed 2013 Title 24 revisions. Finally, despite the unfortunate implication, CAL SMACNA's 600 HVAC contractors statewide were not an endorsing party to the JCEEP letter to the CEC dated October 25, 2011.<sup>1</sup> CAL SMACNA's positions on the 2013 Title 24 revisions are independent and not to be associated with those communicated to you by representatives of JCEEP.

**Comment**

We strongly support the requirement that acceptance testing and documentation under the 2013 Title 24 Energy Efficiency Standards for non-residential structures be completed by highly trained and highly qualified individuals that have extensive knowledge and expertise in the HVAC industry. Not only is this requirement an essential component for the success of Title 24 in achieving our state's goals for energy efficiency in non-residential buildings but it is also important to ensure the continued professionalism of the commercial HVAC industry.

In this regard, it is our position that whether or not certified by AABC, NEBB or TABB, all licensed mechanical engineers and licensed mechanical contractors who are installing contractors, start-up contractors, or service contractors should be allowed to serve as acceptance testing Field Technicians for HVAC equipment and controls. We also support the availability of well considered additional training and/or certification to all these individuals as necessary. This more inclusive approach will ensure highly qualified individuals are performing the work while achieving full and cost-effective compliance with Title 24 in non-residential structures.

To be clear, we respectfully oppose the recent proposal by the Sheet Metal Workers International Association (SMWIA) to only allow AABC, NEBB or TABB certified technicians or

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firms to perform acceptance testing and documentation. This artificial narrowing of the qualified field to perform these Title 24 functions will only serve to drive up commercial project costs and increase project delivery delays. Our real-world experience tells us that when costs are driven higher due to artificial and non-market based reasons (in this case a shortage of qualified Field Technician personnel) some owners and contractors respond with strategies of non-compliance. This creates an unfair and less competitive marketplace for "high-road" and compliant contractors. We cannot allow this to happen.

CAL SMACNA agrees with SMWIA that a place on the Title 24 acceptance forms should be created to clearly identify the responsible party executing the acceptance work. We believe the signature of the individual who accepts responsibility for the performance of these functions will help to further increase accountability and compliance.
