Evaluation of California's Net Energy Metering Program**

Dear Commissioner McAllister,

Silicon Valley Leadership Group, on behalf of its member companies, would like to thank the California Energy Commission (CEC) for the opportunity to comment on the petition submitted on June 5, 2013 by the American Lung Association in California and other parties requesting that the Energy Commission perform a societal cost-benefit evaluation of California's Net Energy Metering (NEM) Program. We write to express our support for the petition and request that the CEC perform the societal cost-benefit study requested by the petitioners.

NEM is helping achieve California's clean energy and climate change goals, including the goal set by Governor Brown to install 12 GW of local clean energy distributed generation by 2020 and the CEC's goals for the New Solar Homes Partnership and Zero Net Energy for new homes and commercial buildings. The Leadership Group supports NEM for homeowners, businesses, schools and governments seeking to invest in clean energy sources.

In addition, net metering can provide significant economic, job creation, and air quality benefits. These societal benefits should be quantified for consideration by policy-makers, and this data will supplement the forthcoming cost-effectiveness evaluation of net metering by the California Public Utilities Commission, which has taken the lead in implementing the state's net metering law. On behalf of our member companies, which include clean tech companies, large end users, universities, investors, and renewable energy companies, we respectfully ask that you grant the petition and perform a societal cost-benefit study of the NEM program.
