I am writing on behalf of the City of Santa Clarita, California to comment on the proposed Desert Renewable Energy Conservation Plan (DRECP). While the City of Santa Clarita appreciates the overall goals of the plan to identify areas within the California desert for wildlife, cultural, and recreation uses and for placement of renewable energy facilities, we are concerned with some specific lands identified within the proposed DRECP.

Since 2010, the Congress of the United States has been considering legislation authored by Senator Barbara Boxer (D-CA), Senator Dianne Feinstein (D-CA) and former Representative Howard P. "Buck" McKeon (R-CA-25), which involves approximately 10,200 acres of land in San Bernardino County. Attached, please find a map (*Victorville Disposal Area California*, dated March 2011) identifying the specific parcels that have been included by reference within H.R. 4332 and S. 3057 (111th Congress), S. 759 (112th Congress), S. 771, S. 2938 and H.R. 5742 (113th Congress). The federal legislation directs that the identified lands be sold by the Secretary of the Interior to fulfill purposes outlined in the six bills. A majority of the parcels contemplated within the six legislative proposals outlined above are included within the proposed DRECP.

In 2010, the lands depicted on the enclosed map were classified as being available for disposal by the United States Bureau of Land Management (BLM). At that time, each of the parcels selected for inclusion in the map were reviewed and cleared for inclusion by a representative of Congressman McKeon's office with the Bureau of Land Management. The parcels were selected for inclusion on the map and incorporation by reference in the legislation because they were identified by the Bureau of Land Management as being available for sale. The same parcels have been used for all six federal bills and at no time has the Bureau of Land Management formally challenged the representation that the lands were eligible for sale.

In testimony presented during a hearing on S. 771 before the Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources Committee's Subcommittee on Public Lands, Forests and Mining on November 20, 2013, the BLM representative did not testify that the lands contemplated in the bill were not classified as being available for sale or that they were being contemplated for inclusion within the Desert Renewable Energy Conservation Plan. Additionally, on October 3, 2013, California Natural Resources Agency Secretary John Laird sent a letter to Senator Boxer in support of her S. 771.

In reviewing the DRECP map, several of the parcels are also now included within the proposed Brisbane Valley Monkey Flower Area of Critical Environmental Concern and several of the parcels are included within the proposed Northern Lucerne Wildlife Linkage Area of Critical Environmental Concern. You will note that the map developed for the six federal bills identifies Monkey Flower habitat and those specific parcels are not among the properties contemplated for sale as directed by the legislation.

The City of Santa Clarita is concerned that the change in land designation from being classified as available for sale to potentially being designated as Areas of Critical Environmental Concern has not gone through an appropriate and rigorous public review process. To the best of the City's knowledge, at no time were the lands now contemplated for designation in the DRECP that overlap with the lands contained within the six federal bills ever discussed with the sponsors of the legislation, Senator Boxer, Senator Feinstein or former Congressman McKeon.

Given that the approximately 10,200 acres of land may likely be included in new legislation, similar to the past six bills, and introduced during the 114th Congress, it is appropriate that those land parcels be withdrawn from the DRECP until such time as the federal legislative effort is definitively resolved. The City of Santa Clarita is formally requesting that the lands depicted as Area A and Area B on the enclosed map entitled *Victorville Disposal Area California*, dated March 2011, be withdrawn from further consideration as part of the Desert Renewable Energy Conservation Plan.

Dear Senator Boxer:

I write to offer my strong support of the legislation you have introduced and Senator Feinstein has cosponsored to enact the Soledad Canyon Settlement Act (S. 771).

As you know, this bill provides the City of Santa Clarita and CEMEX USA the path forward to successfully resolve a nearly fifteen year dispute involving sand and gravel contracts with the Bureau of Land Management (BLM). In addition to cancelling current mining contracts within the City of Santa Clarita that the city has consistently opposed, the bill directs BLM to sell 10,000 acres of public lands near the City of Victorville to compensate CEMEX for its cancelled contracts.

Your bill, S. 771, provides solutions for all parties engaged in this dispute and benefits an important watershed in Southern California. The City of Santa Clarita and its residents will greatly benefit from improved quality of life derived from large-scale sand and gravel mining operations moved to a more appropriate location. CEMEX is made whole for its cancelled contracts in Santa Clarita through the proceeds of other public lands already identified for disposal. Moreover, the natural resources located adjacent to the Upper Santa Clarita River, which contain critical riparian forest woodland and coastal sage scrub habitats, is protected and conserved to the benefit of the region and downstream into Ventura County.

S. 771 is supported by the City of Santa Clarita, CEMEX and additional stakeholders who see this as a solution to address the concerns of a fast growing community.


