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RETI 2.0 Western Outreach Project – Workshops in Portland Aug. 12 and Las Vegas Sept. 1

The Renewable Energy Transmission Initiative (RETI) 2.0 Western Outreach Project is being conducted by the Western Interstate Energy Board (WIEB) and National Association of State Energy Officials (NASEO) at the request of the California Natural Resources Agency. The purpose of the project is to gather stakeholder input from across the Western Interconnection regarding the availability of renewable energy and electric transmission that could contribute to meeting California's renewable energy and greenhouse gas (GHG) objectives by 2030.

This project will collect and summarize stakeholder comments on a set of focus questions by way of two in-person/webinar-broadcast workshops: (1) a Northwest-focused workshop in Portland on August 12, 2016; and (2) a Southwest-focused workshop in Las Vegas on September 1, 2016. The focus question themes (which will also form the agenda for the workshops) are provided below, along with additional information about the RETI 2.0 Western Outreach Project. California's RETI 2.0 is a non-regulatory cooperative project of the California Natural Resources Agency, California Energy Commission, and California Public Utilities Commission, along with the California Independent System Operator and US Bureau of Land Management California Office. The RETI 2.0 Western Outreach Project is a distinct component of the broader RETI 2.0 project, initiated to provide regional perspectives about the future of Western renewable energy development and the transmission necessary to bring it to market. Though the sponsors for the project are California-based agencies, the Western Outreach Project will result in a summary report that other Western states, utilities, industry, and advocates should also find useful.

The California agencies' main purpose for requesting the Western Outreach Project is to better understand the transmission implications of accessing renewable energy from elsewhere in the West, as well as identifying potential markets for California's own excess renewable energy production that may help meet California's 2030 RPS and GHG goals most efficiently. The project is based around a set of focus questions that will be provided to stakeholders before the workshops, and stakeholders will be asked to respond directly to the questions through both verbal and written comments. The agenda of each workshop will feature a series of panels centered on providing responses and discussion around the focus questions. Western state agencies, regulators, utilities, system operators, generation developers, transmission developers, members of the consumer and environmental advocacy communities, and other stakeholders are all invited to participate.

The information received from these workshops and in written comments will be gathered and summarized by WIEB staff, and common themes will be noted. A final report will be prepared that summarizes stakeholder responses to the focus questions, and to the extent possible, draws conclusions based on consensus comments or technical data. The report will be used by the California agencies involved in RETI 2.0 as an input into the RETI 2.0 process. The Western Outreach Report will inform the conclusions and recommendations made in the RETI 2.0 Report, expected in late 2016. The Western Outreach Report will also be made available by WIEB and NASEO for state and federal agencies, utilities and developers, and advocates to inform planning processes throughout the West.
