Agenda

Presentations and discussions will be on the Energy Commission's investment portfolios and funding opportunities; solicitation and grant process; and funding for disadvantaged and low-income communities. The workshop will also include a state and tribal roundtable discussion on priority funding areas, opportunities to improve access, and barriers to participation in Energy Commission funding opportunities.

Background

In September 2011, Governor Jerry Brown signed Executive Order B-10-11, directing state agencies and departments to encourage effective government-to-government cooperation, collaboration, communication, and consultation with tribes on matters that may affect tribes in California. In 2012 and 2014, the California Natural Resources Agency and the Energy Commission, respectively, adopted Tribal Consultation policies implementing Executive Order B-10-11. The Energy Commission's Tribal Consultation Policy was revised in 2017.

The intent of these actions was also embodied in the passage of Assembly Bill 52 (Gatto, Chapter 532, Statutes of 2014), which provided a process and specific requirements for lead agencies under the California Environmental Quality Act to consult with Native American tribes on avoiding or mitigating impacts to tribal cultural resources.

Senate Bill (SB) 350 (de León, Chapter 547, Statutes of 2015), the Clean Energy and Pollution Reduction Act of 2015, directed the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) and the California Energy Commission to create a Disadvantaged Communities Advisory Group (DACAG) that would provide advice on programs proposed to achieve clean energy and pollution reduction. DACAG was established on December 14, 2017. As defined in SB 350, disadvantaged communities are the most burdened census tracts in California. Relative burden is determined by review of data on 20 pollution, health, and socio-economic factors.

In November 2018, the Energy Commission cohosted the inaugural Tribal Energy Summit with the Pechanga Band of Luiseño Indians, the CPUC, and the Governor's Tribal Advisor. During the Tribal Energy Summit, participants provided recommendations to improve the relationship and synergies between the state's energy agencies and tribes, including a recommendation for the Energy Commission to hold a workshop on energy funding programs available to tribes, and explore how those programs could be better aligned with tribal priorities and needs.
