Dear Mr. Hendry:

As required by Senate Bill 350 (de León, Chapter 547, Statutes of 2015 (SB 350) in the Public Utilities Code (PUC) Section 9622) the California Energy Commission has reviewed San Francisco Public Utilities Commission's *Integrated Resource Plan filing* (IRP), which was received on February 27, 2019. The Energy Commission informed San Francisco Public Utilities Commission on March 7, 2019, that the IRP filing was complete, as requested by Chapter 3, Section B.1 of the *Publicly Owned Utilities' Integrated Resource Plan Guidelines* (POU IRP Guidelines).<sup>1</sup>

Based on a detailed review and analysis of the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission IRP, the standardized tables, and other supporting information, I have determined that the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission IRP is consistent with PUC Section 9621 requirements, and meets California's energy and other policy goals, including:

- Achieving greenhouse gas emission reduction targets commensurate with the electricity sector's percentage of economy wide reductions of 40 percent from 1990 levels by 2030.
- Meeting the renewables portfolio standard of 50 percent by 2030, based on SB 350.
- Ensuring planning goals related to retail rates, reliability, transmission and distribution systems, localized air pollution, and disadvantaged communities.
- Considering the role of renewable resources, grid efficiencies, energy storage, and distributed resources in meeting peak demand.
- Addressing procurement of energy efficiency and demand response, energy storage, transportation electrification, and portfolio diversification.

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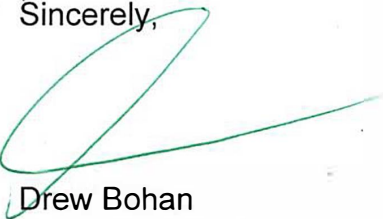
